ANNUAL REPORT: 2018-2019

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Executive Summary

Association For Development has been working on the issues of women and children for more than two and a half decades. We emphasis on extending the bundle of services to the survivors of crime especially sexual assault (adult and children), provide quality education to children from the underprivileged community and groups. We continuously endeavor to improve the system and make it favorable for women, youth and children. For this purpose, we continuously engage with the government through consultations, workshops, capacity building programmes, etc. The organization programmes are designed to provide tailor made services to women, youth and children so that their needs are addressed in a most efficient manner. During this year we have catered following issues through different programmes:

Child Protection: AFD mainly deals with the issue of child protection under the Victim Assistance Program (VAP) and initiative for prevention from sexual assault through sensitization workshops on child rights and gender. VAP is the nomenclature used by AFD to denote the direct services program run by us for the women and children requiring support and protection. A team of Counselors provide assistance to survivors at Police Stations, Hospitals, Courts and CWCs in East District, Delhi. It is a 24 Hours helpline service, when any police station of East Delhi receives information about the case of sexual assault; refer the matter to us immediately. Under the program the survivors of sexual assault are provided the immediate redressal and assistance in terms of counseling, medical assistance, legal process etc

Another component of our intervention is prevention of sexual assault by empowering girls to raise their voice against the incident of sexual assault and other gender based violence with girls through series of workshops, trainings, exposure visits and other confidence building activities. Children of 15 Government Girls Senior Secondary Schools and Trilokpuri community were taken up as focused areas for intervention by engaging different stakeholders to work towards common goal. It is a fact that educational institutions play an important role in shaping the child's future, a child spend a lot of time of his/her initial years within the schools, learns and develops behavior that lasts a lifetime. Hence, it is needed that the environment of the educational institutions should be safe and secure. But due to lack of effective preventive mechanism and grievance redressal opportunities for children, the menace of sexual abuse with children in school,


homes and communities continues unabated. A lot of work is required to be done to prevent such incidents and develop a safe and secure environment in schools and community.

Child Education: The initiative has been taken with the objective to ensure qualitative education to children through community participation. Lack of quality of education in the existing government schools is an important issue in the community. Overcrowding and lack of appropriate facilities is a common phenomenon in the government schools. Also, accurate information on the higher education and vocational training courses is missing among the adolescents seeking to secure their future livelihood. As a result, unemployment is rising and energy of the youth has been involved in various distractive and antisocial activities. Hence AFD is helping to fill the gaps through different strategies to promote the quality education to children and to channelize energy in the positive manner.

Youth empowerment: There are huge numbers of energetic youth in the community who are engaged in different kind of anti-social activities due to lack of constructive engagement on day to day basis. A large number of youth are also addicted to drugs and alcohol which is very harmful for their health. Also, due to lack of adequate guidance and opportunities the youth is unfocused. Considering all, AFD has been working with youth of community to channelize their energy in a manner through different activities that can shape their life and contribute to the society as a whole.

I. Crisis Intervention Center (CIC)

(Supported by Delhi Commission for Women, Govt. of NCT of Delhi)

The programme was initially implemented in collaboration with Delhi Police. The effectiveness of the programme was recognized by government of NCT of Delhi, in healing the suffering of the survivors of sexual assault. Therefore, this model was adopted and expanded by Govt. of NCT of Delhi all over Delhi. AFD is running this programme in East District, Delhi. Under this programme, the organization provides round the clock services to the survivors of sexual assault (minor and adult), trafficking, missing/found girl child and women in distress. AFD provides following services to them:

- I. Assess the survivor's immediate needs.
- II. Counseling and legal guidance to survivors and her family members.
- III. Support the survivor and her family at Police Station, Hospital and Court.
- IV. Assist and facilitate in the rehabilitation of survivor of sexual assault.

The primary objective of this programme is to provide immediate support and familiarize survivors and their family members with the legal procedures followed during the process. Our counselors reach immediately, as soon as, the matter is referred by Police or DCW or 181 women helpline. But in some cases, the counselors also take *suo- moto* action, on cases that come across through media reports or other sources. Following are the main services provided by AFD to the survivors of sexual assault:


- a. Counseling:** The counseling is provided to reduce the trauma caused by the incident and reinstate the survivor in pre-morbid state. Sessions are also conducted with the family members to providing them support and prepare them for the future. Continuous monitoring and follow-ups are conducted in critical cases and the survivors are also connected to the appropriate authorities for help.
- b. Medical Treatment/examination:** In cases of sexual abuse, primary need of the survivor is to provide medical attention to mitigate the injuries caused by the incident. The survivors are counseled about the relevance of medical examination and MLC, to gather forensic evidences and assess injuries. The counselor facilitates and accompanies the

survivor for medical examination in order to provide them support and ensure the adherence to protocol.

- c. Legal Aid and Guidance:** It is seen, in the Indian context, that the lack of awareness of relevant laws, legal procedures and legal rights often affect the coping capacity of the survivors. The, counselors from AFD take up the matter, in urgent and appropriate cases, with concerned senior police officials, public prosecutors and judicial authorities to remove bottlenecks and impediments in the investigation and trial of cases. We assist the survivors and their family members in court hearings; accompany them to the court and police stations, as and when required. Additionally, AFD provides relevant legal inputs at crucial stages of the case. In this entire process, we adopt a persuasive approach rather than confrontational and antagonistic one vis-à-vis the authorities.
- d. Assistance in expediting compensation claim:** It has been observed that the family of the survivor faces difficulties in completing formalities due to the cumbersome process. Therefore, AFD helps in expediting the claim for these families. Our counselors coordinate with the concerned police station; offices of DLSA, RCC Lawyer to take up the matter for compensation and keep the survivors updated about the case development.
- e. Coordination with the concerned Investigating Officers and Police Stations:** As soon as any case of sexual abuse comes to our knowledge, the counselor coordinates with the concerned Investigating Officer and Police Station for social work intervention. The counselor makes visits to the police station and helps the survivors to coordinate with the I.O. for the legal formalities at the police station, hospital & court for the recording of statement and for the medical examination. We keep in regular contact with investigating officer in order to remain updated on the status of the case. Also, the counselor informs the survivors about their rights at the police station, hospitals and courts.
- f. Accompany the survivors to court:** Under legal guidance programme, the counselor accompanies the survivors to the court for recording of 164 CrPC. statement. Once the case was taken up, under legal intervention programme, it is followed till the last stage.

AFD, being a designated CIC, East Delhi provided their services to the cases reported in 12 police stations located in the same district. During the project year, we have intervened and provided support in the cases of sexual assault, molestation, trafficking, missing/found children etc.

- a. **Case Intervention:** During the project period, AFD intervened in 653 cases which include cases of sexual assault (child and adult), trafficking, missing/found children, molestation, harassment and others. It is observed that in the month of July AFD has seen the highest number of cases being recorded in the year.



b) **Penetrative Sexual assault:** The cases of penetrative sexual assault are lodged under section 375, 376, 376A, 376B, 376C, 376D IPC and 3,4,5,6 POCSO Act, 2012. During the project period, AFD intervened in total of 286 cases of penetrative sexual assault and provided appropriate assistance and guidance.



C. Non-Penetrative Sexual Assault, harassment, molestation case: The cases of non-penetrative sexual assault are lodged under section 354 of IPC and 7, 8,9,10 of POCSO Act, 2012. During the project period, total of 70 cases of non-penetrative sexual assault have been dealt by the AFD. It is observed that cases of children are more than that of the adult.



II. PTC-AFD-Pratidhi initiative making schools safe for girl students

(Supported by PTC Foundation)

The project focuses on making school a safe place for girl children by engaging different concerned stakeholders to work towards a common goal. It is a fact that educational institutions play an important role in shaping the child's future. A child spends a lot of time of his/her initial years within the school, learns and form behavior that lasts a lifetime. Hence, it is needed that the environment of the educational institutions should be safe and secure; but, it is disheartening that sexual abuse of the girls within educational institutions is frequently reported despite various safety measures adopted by the Government. It shows lack of awareness and sensitization on prevention of sexual assault and existing grievance redressal mechanisms, as a result the menace of sexual abuse of girls continues unabated. Also, the sexual assault with girl children is closely related to the gender based violence but due to various reasons it is usually neglected. Thus, school is an ideal nodal point to empower girls about their rights, laws and other important information/issues to prevent them from sexual abuse.

The project aims to empower the girl children in the educational institutions/schools for the prevention of child sexual abuse by adopting different strategies and ensure professional handling of the survivors of sexual assault.

The key components of the project are as follows:

- 1) **Empowering girl children through regular workshops in schools on-** (a) Gender sensitization (b) Child Sexual Abuse and (c) Child Rights. This component majorly deals with prevention of girl children from sexual abuse and to create a sense of empowerment among the girls.
- 2) **Engagement of different stakeholders-** The project has been engaging multiple stakeholders such as School Administration, Police, Delhi Commission for Women (DCW), Delhi Commission for Protection of Child Rights (DCPCR), Education Department, Delhi State Legal Service Authority (DLSA) etc. to create a synergy among all to ensure prevention of incidences of child sexual assault with girl children in the schools and nearby areas.
- 3) **Psycho-social rehabilitation** of the survivors of sexual abuse is another component under this project which focuses on holistic well-being of the survivors and the family through long

term sessions of psychological counseling and facilitation of medical, legal and other procedures.

During this year, AFD conducted following activities under the project:

A. Workshops on Gender Sensitization, Child Rights and identification of Child Leaders:

It is one of the crucial components of the project. Starting from January, 2019 total of 27 workshops (15 on gender sensitization and 12 on Child Sexual Abuse) have been conducted with adolescents girls studying in 7th,8th and 9th classes in selected 15 Government Senior Secondary Schools situated in District East Delhi and Shahdara. A total of 1244 adolescent girls, studying in these schools have been empowered on subjects such as gender sensitization, puberty, menstruation myth and Child sexual abuse as per the manual developed by the organization.

a) **Workshops on Gender Sensitization**

With the objective to create awareness on gender, gender disparity, gender discrimination, gender biased behavior and attitude and other gender associated issues and to sensitize the girls to talk on the issues; series of workshops were conducted in Government Girls Senior Secondary Schools of district East of Education department. It is observed that gender is usually applied interchangeably with a biological difference between girls and boys, although; gender is socially constructed norm for girls and boys. Hence, the workshop helped the participants to understand the same so that they can get a sense of equality with boys. The workshops helped the participants understand the issues and communicate about the same. The girls have lots of misconception about the physical and biological changes occur in the body during puberty because menstruation is still a taboo and is seldom discussed by the parents with their children. Thus, girls were oriented on puberty and menstruation. Further, the girls participated in the



activities and bring forward their doubts which otherwise they find it difficult to discuss with parents or elsewhere.

b) Workshops on Child Sexual Abuse

Sexual assault with the child creates a trauma that impacts their holistic development. It is a fact that in cases of child sexual abuse most of the time the accused is known to the child who hold a position of trust for the child and family members. Many a time young children are unaware of crime is committed with them as they are unable to understand whether the act

occurring with them is right or wrong. Also, sexual assault being a sensitive issue; rarely discuss at home by the parents with the children. Further, very limited channels are available to provide the concrete and accurate information to the children about the sexual assault so that they could take necessary steps to prevent the same. With an objective to generate awareness, series of workshops were conducted with adolescent girls in Govt. Girls Senior Secondary Schools of district East Delhi, Department Of Education empowering 579 adolescent girls. The workshop mainly provided information on safe and un-safe touch, forms of sexual abuse with children, the main provisions of POCSO Act, 2012, helpline numbers and the existing support services for children. The participants readily shared their experiences and enquire more on the issues.

c) **Workshops with children of Trilokpuri community, Delhi**

The girl children living in slums and resettlement communities are more vulnerable due to their low socio-economic and educational background which lead to rise in gender based violence specially child sexual assault. The problem is much sever in slums and resettlement colonies where parents are busy in earning livelihood and have little time to dedicate and look after the activities of their children. Also, in the absence of correct information they blindly accept the gender norms and continue to suffer in silence. This makes them susceptible to child sexual abuse and gender discrimination.



Another issue faced by adolescent girls is erroneous information on menstruation and puberty. They indulge in menstrual myths and unsafe hygiene practices which sometime poses health hazard and leads to life threatening conditions. Considering all, series of workshops with adolescence were conducted in the resettlement colony-Trilokpuri located at East Delhi. During discussion on puberty and menstruation myth a lot of adolescent girls came up to the trainer and shared their quarries which they would otherwise feel shy to ask their mothers, sisters and friends. The workshops empowered participants on child rights, menstruation, child sexual abuse and various provisions to protect interest of a child. Following are the details of workshops conducted with the children in the community.

B. Child Assistance program (CAP):

The component deals with rehabilitation and providing holistic assistance to the survivor of sexual assault and their family members through long term intervention. It is observed that the survivors of child sexual assault are victimized by the incident and get re-victimized by rigorous and uncomfortable government and legal procedures. The social stigma attached with the incident and re-victimization at various levels leads to psychological trauma in long term. Psychological trauma if remain un-treated might lead to psychological issues, difficulty in functioning and in some cases it might become fatal. Professional counseling sessions helps the survivor to effectively create a coping mechanism and develop a positive outlook towards life.

Professional counseling sessions with long-term support was provided to the survivor and their family members to restore them to pre-morbid state and to ensure a better social and

psychological state in future. During the project period, we have intervened in 12 cases of sexual nature and provided counseling to 13 children (11 are girls and 2 are boys). In 10 cases, the survivor and their family members got counseling services to effectively deal with the trauma, methods to help survivor towards early recovery and facilitate to move on in life. Also, in 3 cases we took up the matter with the police to provide safety to the children and their family members. Further, in one case we coordinated with DLSA, bank and DCW to expedite the process of compensation for the survivor.

Case studies

Case study-1

An 8 year old child was playing outside her home in East Delhi when she was taken to an isolated place and brutally sexually assaulted. The child sustained serious injuries on her head, face, mouth, left eye, abdomen, vagina and anus and was admitted to the hospital for medical treatment by her mother and police were informed. The child was referred to specialized hospital where she underwent surgery to rectify the injuries. As a consequence, the child developed a fear and

became apprehensive to go anywhere without parents, she also used to get nightmares and parents were also worried because of the stigmas associated with child sexual abuse.

Interventions:

- Initially a home visit was conducted to understand and assess the living condition and environment of the family to make future plans to rehabilitate the survivor.
- The counselor visited the hospital to assist the parents of the survivor and assess their need to help them deal with the trauma.
- Series of psychological counseling sessions were conducted with the survivor and the family members to help them overcome trauma and move on in life.
- Facilitated safe and hygienic temporary free shelter for the family and the child to protect the child from infection.
- Facilitated compensation process in coordination with other agencies to cater to nutritional and other requirements of the child and help in speedy recovery.
- Coordinated with DLSA for disbursement of compensation amount as the family was struggling with the process.
- Visited and coordinated with concerned bank branch to make the account operational as the family was struggling to make the ends meet.

Case study-2

A five year old girl child was sexually molested by a neighbor. In the evening the child requested the father for money for snacks; she went out, was eating and playing. Meanwhile the perpetrator came, removed her bottoms and slapped her on face, crowd gathered and a lady called her mother, the child narrated the incident to her mother. At this the mother got to know that the accused is a neighbor, the child's father, called the police immediately.

The **child was scared to go to school** because of the presence of the accused outside the school and she became very reserved because of the incident. **The father also experienced psychological stress post incident as he reflected suicidal tendencies and revealed that he attempted suicide twice as he was concerned about the safety of his family and financial instability.**

Interventions:

- Initially a home visit was conducted to understand and assess the living condition and environment of the family to make future plans to rehabilitate the survivor.
- Series of psychological counseling sessions were conducted with the survivor and the family members to help them deal with the trauma and rebuilt their confidence.
- Psychological counseling was provided to the father to help him lessen the suicidal tendencies.
- Facilitated with DCPU, East Delhi, DWCD, Govt. NCT of Delhi for sponsorship for the survivor from as the family is struggling to meet the financial need.
- Steps for safety of child and family were taken up with the concerned police officials to provide a safe environment for the survivor.
- Re-establishment of career opportunities for father were discussed with the concerned SHO as the family was struggling to make the ends meet and this was causing emotional trauma to the father and a big cause of two attempts of suicide.

C. Child Leaders program:

Child leaders program focuses on selecting adolescent girls from 15 Government Senior Secondary Schools located at East district of Education Department, molding them into agent of change to empower other children and community people. The child leaders were identified from the workshop conducted in the schools and various opportunities were provided to improve their skills, knowledge and build their confidence so that they can take up the various issues further with other concerned stakeholders. The child leaders will help in expansion of the impact of the program by reaching to other children in their neighborhood, community, schools etc to make them empowered. During this project year, following activities were conducted under the child leaders program:

a) Child Leaders Interaction Program

Child Ambassadors interaction programme was primarily designed for the Child Ambassadors selected during the workshop but the parents of children were also keen to know about the initiative hence they also participated in the program. A brief about the initiative, funders and

activities were provided to the participants. The participants were oriented about the benefit of Child Ambassadors program to children in terms of personality development, empowerment etc.

On 16th March, 2019 Child Ambassadors interaction program was organized at Shakarpur police station where 68 people participated in the event. Ms. Nirmala,



official from Shakarpur police station and Mr. Yogesh, director AFD addressed the participants and gave them information on the process of filing complaint/FIR, role of parents in keeping children safe. The parents were also suggested to monitor any behavioral change in the child as it might be due to bullying, child sexual abuse etc.

b) Exposure visits for Child Leaders/Ambassadors

An exposure visit to Shakarpur Police station for 38 Child Leaders was organized on 16/03/2019.



Exposure visits was designed to allow Child Ambassadors to interact with stakeholders in their natural work environment and gain knowledge about the process and their role in child protection and prevention of crime against children. Ms. Nirmala, official from Shakarpur police station gave tour of the police station. The participants visited help desk where they were explained the process of filing FIR. The participants also visited maalkhana, jail and other important rooms inside the police station.

III. Promoting children right to education through improved enrolment, retention and quality of education in Trilokpuri, a resettlement colony in Delhi (Supported by Hellmann World Wide Logistic Ltd.)

Education is necessary at childhood age. This is the period to provide them a chance to develop mentally, physically and socially. It gives them experience to start facing the world. The importance of education cannot be defined in words as it helps in shaping the future as well as personality of an individual. It is responsibility of parents, guardian and society to provide them right education at the right age.

Also it is equally important to look for child's interest and accordingly provide education to them. This is a crucial stage which will impact them effectively either in a positive way or in a negative way. So it is a collective responsibility to take care of them and guide them to success.

People from resettlement communities like Trilokpuri struggle hard to earn the livelihood and as a result they could not spend time with their children and look after them. There are other factors leading children to more vulnerable condition. As a result, many children are easily trapped by the anti-social elements and become drug addicts. Many children growing up in the Trilokpuri experience the childhood that often defies the image of 'innocent childhood'. These areas have shortage of dedicated public spaces for children to use for recreational activities. Even if spaces are available like parks, they are un-safe for the children as they are used by anti-social elements. But that does not mean that these children have no childhood, only a different kind of childhood that sees them playing on rough, uneven ground, taking on the multiple role of everyday life, and sharing responsibilities with adults in domestic and public spaces in the community.

Education for these children is one of the major concerns as the parent's struggles to pay attention. The quality education in existing schools in the community is another important issue that needs to be addressed. Overcrowding and a lack of appropriate facilities is a common phenomenon in Govt. schools. Accurate information on higher education and vocational training courses is also missing for adolescents seeking options to secure future livelihood. As, a result, rate of unemployment among youth is rising in the community and Trilokpuri has a huge young unemployed population.

AFD has taken initiative towards providing education to children with the aim to foster all round development of children. All round development essentially means intellectual, physical, moral

and social development. To fulfill these objectives, we provide qualitative education to children and adolescent and engage them with co-curricular activities side by side. The co-curricular activities such as music, art or drama, sports, participation in debates give children an opportunity to develop their skills and exhibit their non-academic abilities. The program was initiated in month of August, 2018 and during the project year AFD has conducted the following activities:

a) **Supplementary education centers**

Four Supplementary education centers has been setup in Trilokpuri, Delhi. The community children across the classes were enrolled in the centers. A total of 212 students are enrolled in the four supplementary centers. The students are taught English, as it is observed it is their Achilles heels. It is believed that the English will help the children to learn and understand the subject better and other subjects too. The interior of the centers are developed to be creative, colorful, informative and knowledgeable, where children like to come and spend their time with joyful learning. Play way and other interesting methods are adopted to keep the children engaged and help grasping the concept easily.

b) **Remedial coaching classes**

Remedial coaching classes were organized for the students of 10th and 12th standards to help them in education and get better marks. 10th and 12th are the classes in which children feel high pressure to score good marks to pursue further education. Mostly children coming to classes are those who are pursuing education from distance mode and had once dropped out of the education. A total of 22 children were enrolled in the remedial classes and got benefitted from the remedial centre.

c) Formation of youth groups and periodic meetings

The main focus of the youth group is to promote education among children and community members. The youth through regularly meeting indulges the youth members in promoting education and issues concerning the community. During this project period the following issues were discussed in the youth meetings:

- Child Rights
- Improving quality of life through life skills
- Pollution free Diwali
- Importance of education and save girl child
- Ways to increase participation of youth and community members in community development.



As the youth of the community is highly energetic and has potential to do the good work if they are guided properly. Also, if they will not received continuous guidance and engagement they might indulge in anti-social activities. Hence, a group with 40 youth has been formed and series of meetings were conducted, not only to discuss issues of their interest but also issues related to community as a whole which also affects them.

It is observed that parents take initiative to interact with the teachers and participate in such activities. Some of the topics discussed during the meeting were:

- Importance of extracurricular activities in life of a child.
- Time management for children during examination
- Understanding interest of a child in extracurricular activities.
- Domestic violence and its impact on family and children.
- Benefit of AFD supplementary centers on education quality of children and exploring improvement in children in studies.

g) Library for Children

Childhood is a period in which learning start to develop in significant and permanent way. Studies conducted in the area of education indicate the environment and the experiences of children apart from developmental factors to be influential on learning as well. One of the important aspects of the education program provided by AFD is to improve their vocabulary, to use words correctly and appropriately. Also make them able to express their feelings, through language and develop a love for books and the habit of reading. One of the convenient environment for the advancement of language



development skills is children's library. Library also plays a very important role in promoting the progress of knowledge. There are many children who love reading but cannot afford to buy books because the prices of the books are very high. A library for the children was set-up where children can visit and read the books and enhance their knowledge. Since no government library is available in the community the idea is praised by the parents and children as their children are indulging in the reading habits and spend less time wandering ideal. Total of 250 books are available in the library ranging from beginner level to expert's level, thus attracting children of all age group and reading level.

h) Scholarship to students for higher studies

The purpose of the scholarship is to enables academically distinguished, economically disadvantaged students to excel in higher education. It was observed that there are number of students who wanted to continue their higher education but due to financial constrains, they were not in a position to pursue. Hence, it was necessary to provide support them for higher education.

The program process begins by creating awareness among the students and community about the initiative and promoting students to apply for the same. From the pool of applications the students with strong desire to peruse the education and coming from economically disadvantaged background were identified by the team through assessment of the family and child by conducting home visits and interaction with the family members. An interactive session was organized by the

organization to understand the applicant better and understand his/her dreams and desires. Panel of 3 members interacted with the candidates and after that 10 candidates were found suitable and were selected for the scholarship.

i) Project Inauguration program

An inauguration program was organized by the organization on 5th September, 2018. The program was attended approximately by the 50 people and children from the community. Representatives from the Hellmann Worldwide Logistics and Help for Children In Need Foundation (HCNF) were present in the event. The event was organized at community centre Block-32/33 Trilokpuri Delhi-110092. The program started with the greeting the guests and the participants. Further the brief of the work carried out in the community was shown all along with the challenges faced and steps taken to resolve the challenges. Therefore, the children presented stories, showed their learning by the project



initiative. The youth group presented nukkad natak promoting importance of education and girl child education along with songs, speech and other colorful performances. Then Mr. Shubhendu Das, CEO from the Hellmann Worldwide Logistic Ltd. addressed the children and shared the information about the initiative enhancing the quality of education of the community children.

j) Kite making and flying event

Kite making and flying event was organized on the occasion of National Children's Day i.e 14th November, 2018 in the Trilokpuri community. The objective of the program was to provide a platform to the community children and youth to show their concerns towards education, protection and other Child Rights issues. The program was attended by more than 300 children, 50 parents, representatives of other organizations, and other community people.



In the program the authorities of the concern government departments, elected representatives and representative of the NGO's participated in the program. The members of the Delhi Commission for Protection of Child Rights (DCPCR) Ms. Reeta Singh and Ms. Ranjana Prasad, members of Delhi Commission for Women (DCW) Ms. Firdos and Ms. Promila Gupta also Ms. Gargi from District Child Protection unit (DCPU) Department of Women and Child Development (WCD) joined the programme as a state representatives. Also, Mr. Rohit Mehoralia and Ms. Saroj elected Counselors and Mr. Raju Dhingana (MLA, Trilokpuri) joined the programme to motivate the participants.



Further, the participants made kites and wrote slogans on the education and other Child Rights and flew them in air as a mark of freedom. A big kite as a symbol of freedom and their aspirations was also made

by the youth group, which was later presented to the guests with the promise to help the children in achieving their dreams. The youth group also performed a play/nukkad natak focusing on importance of education for children. The play was enjoyed by all the viewers and the performance of the youth group were applauded by all. Youth and children developed a charter of demands which was later shared with the guests. Further the guests addressed the children and other participants and ensured to take required action in this regard.

Before the programme a workshop on kite making was organized for the youth group/volunteers on 06th October, 2018, where they were trained on kite making and that group of youth assisted participants during the kites making event as per the scheduled programme.

k) Exposure visits

Exposure visits are essential part of child development. It is believed that the child learn faster by taking part in an activities away from regular coursework. Exposure visits allow the child to see and understand things in their natural environment and at the same time it provides much needed space for recreational needs. It is also believed that the children retain more information when they are involved in performing the task. Here, during the project period two exposure visits has been conducted as following:

(i) Kidzania

Community children visited the Kidzania on an exposure visit on 18 January, 2019. A total of 80 children from the community visited the place. The place allowed the children to help learn new skills in a fun way. The children learn being professionals and even got the experience of banking, doctor and other professions. Children enjoyed the event as they very rarely get the opportunity to gain exposure of such recreational places.



(ii) Aeroplanet

On 16/02/2019, 90 children associated with AFD in Trilokpuri community were out on the wheels to the AEROPLANET, Dwarka for the exposure visit. The children were excited to visit the



airplane as it was their first time sitting in the plane. The children saw and sat in the dummy Airbus A-300 that gives the complete understanding of an aircraft, a 50 seater CRJ-200 was in the campus to give boarding the aircraft, air turbulence, aircraft take-off and landing experience. Full view of the plane from the side gallery, cockpit view from

inside and outside was also available for every learner. The visit not only displayed and familiarized the students to air travel, but also taught the children aviation etiquettes and manners. Trampoline and bouncy games were the additional attraction. Rope crossing was another activity that was thoroughly enjoyed by all as they were asking for more. Children enjoyed dance and music and enjoyed to the core at the dance floor. Picnic was followed by delicious food to replenish energy utilized during enjoying the day.

1) Celebration of National Girl Child Day and International Education Day

National Girl Child Day and International Education Day is celebrated every year on 24th of



January. International Education Day focuses on role and importance of education in life of children and linking it to Sustainable Development Goals (SGDs). National Girl child Day celebration was initiated to offer additional support and new opportunities to the girls in the country and highlight atrocities of girl child. Education plays an

important role in promoting gender equality and empowerment of children. It equips the child with knowledge and tools to take decisions and broadens it horizon. Education also positively impacts a girls it allows them to get knowledge and attain financial independence in the long run.

On this occasion, AFD organized a drawing competition for the children of Trilokpuri community allowing them to create beautiful posters and drawing promoting child education. Total of 60 children from the community took part in the activity and painted their dreams and desires. The drawing competition was followed by a rally where other children from the

community joined the AFD team and children to generating awareness, promote children right to education and urged the parents to send their children to school. Rally was followed by a beautiful nukkad natak presented by community youth focusing on importance of education and gender discrimination faced by girls while perusing education. The nukkad natak was presented in front of community people and



was applauded by the community where they pledged to take active participation in educating their girls too.

m) Sports event for children

One day state level sports event was organized for the children. The event was organized on 24th March, 2019 on ground of Lovely Public Senior Secondary School, Delhi-110091. The event was organized for the children to have fun filled day and indulge in the sports activities. The activities were great was to indulge in the activities and adapt interaction skills.

At the end of the event the gift (badminton) were distributed to all the children to encourage them for the sports and play.

n) Theater workshop for youth

Three days theater workshop was organized for the youth group of AFD from 18th March, 2019 to 20th March, 2019. A total of 45 youth participated in the event. The idea of the workshop revolves



around giving a platform to youth to express their emotion and feeling in a constructive way. The idea behind organizing the workshop was to aid the youth in the constructively express their feelings and maintain their body-language and face gestures. The workshop started with the warm-up

exercises and introduction to help the youth to know each other. During the workshop various exercises were conducted to teach the youth to help them express their emotions better. The participants also wrote the play and induced the teaching from the workshop incorporating them in their street play to make it more interactive and attract more visitors. Ms. Archan Kaul, theatre

expert conducted the workshop with youth was highly applauded by the youth participants as it helped them enhance their expressions.

o) Soft skills development program

Soft skills are essential part of personality development it helps the child to acquire a set of skills with self awareness. Soft skills helps a child to develop its social, emotional, mental skills and horn it way to effectively community with other and work with others for a better outcome. One day workshop was conducted with the community children in community centre of Block 31/32, Trilokpuri where 40 children participated in the event. The workshop was conducted by Ms. Pragya Sethi from Help for Children in Need Foundation (HCNF).

p) Financial literacy program

A financial literacy program was organized for the community people where 50 women and men participated in the event. The experts from The Human Safety Network were present to address the participants and provided them the useful information. The trainers shared the information on the different scheme of the Govt. and their procedures so that community people can avail the benefit of the same. The participants were taught about the smart saving tips and tricks and stress was laid on having financial knowledge and importance of saving.



q) Cleaning and building of parks/play areas

Three cleanliness drives were undertaken in the community to beautify the parks and clean the space for children to indulge in activities. Also, plantation activities were conducted in association with the children and community members to beautify the community parks. The children adopted the saplings and pledged to care of them.



The sapling not only will beautify the parks but would also add to the preservation of environment.
